The kittens keep coming! It looks like another bumper year for kittens, so let your friends, family, and neighbors know that we are looking for lots of fabulous forever homes for this year's kitten "crop". We are now showing our foster animals for adoption at 3 different sites, PETCO in Port Hueneme and Camarillo and of course, at our Adoption Center/Thrift Shop at the corner of Market and Donlon. Please see page 7 for hours and days.

We are still desperately in need of foster families for a few of our cats and kittens. This would be a short-term fostering commitment through the summer and/or fall to help us manage our kitten tsunami. We can even wean kittens for you if fostering bottle babies or a momcat and some kittens is just too big a challenge for you.

Please think about fostering. It's easier than it sounds, it's really fun, and you are saving a life (or 2 or 3) when you foster a cat or kitten. When you foster it means that our veteran CCR foster families can say "Yes" to another kitten in need because by fostering, you created a space for us to take in another. Please call us if you have space in your heart and in your home to foster a homeless cat or kitten.

As a "no-kill" animal rescue group, sometimes we get left holding the bag...or the cat as it happens!

Cats Cradle Rescue has many cats that will need a lifetime of care since many of these animals will never be suitable candidates for adoption. Some have litter-box issues, others show aggression towards humans or other animals, while just a few were just never cute enough to be adopted. A few have medical issues that discourage most adopters. *(continued on next page)*

OUR HAPPY ENDINGS!





He's adjusting pretty well over all. He did NOT like the car ride home, and he was kinda mad at us for a few days. It took him a day or so to come out from under the desk we had in the room ("his" room), but he eventually moved to his litter box for about another day, and then lately he's just been hanging out next to his box. It's his little "comfort zone" if he gets overwhelmed. :) He's not quite to the stage where he's welcoming us when we come in the room yet, but

it only takes about 20 seconds or so of our scratching him and playing with him before he turns a 180 and gets really, really lovey dovey. He's adorable! We've discovered he likes his belly scratched (like...he REALLY likes it), and he'll sometimes flip over and put his paws above his head as if he's saying, "Okay, belly time!" If we scratch on his tummy or his backside or his tail enough, he'll reach out with his paws (and just a LITTLE bit of claws) and pull our arms into his belly, hold our arm with his paws, and nuzzle with his head. It's like he's giving us hugs, and it's the cutest thing we've ever seen! Mostly he just likes lots and lots of head and back scratches.

He's playing with his toys OK (a feather stick and a couple of mice toys and a little stress ball that he sometimes bats around), but his favorite is PAPER! He LOVES paper. We've just started leaving papers on the floor, because he likes just STANDING on it. He also REALLY likes Trader Joes shopping bag handles. We just pull them off the bags and he goes nuts! He'll play with those and chew/bat them for 10-20 minutes at a time.

He's eating really well now (it took him about 2 days before he ate, but then he got really hungry!) Surprisingly, he's totally avoided the wet food but LOVES the dry Science Diet you gave us. Go figure! He's got the litter box thing down pat, too. Pretty much he's really well adjusted. We've given him a few hours of supervised time out in the main rooms, too, because he just suddenly decided one night that he wanted to explore!
